

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INTRODUCTION

The Annual Regional Analysis is a set of facts to inform community dialogue and district planning.

The purpose of the Annual Regional Analysis (ARA) is to support CPS's goal of providing every student with a high-quality education in every neighborhood by giving stakeholders a consistent array of information regarding school quality, enrollment patterns, school choice, and program offering by region. The goal is to ensure that every student in Chicago has reasonable access to quality public schools and a variety of schools and programs.

The report includes information on all CPS schools, including traditional neighborhood, selective enrollment, magnet, charter, special education specialty, and Options (alternative) schools.


This document is a common fact base from which to understand the school landscape in communities. The intent of the ARA is not to provide recommendations but rather a set of findings based on the data that serves as input to inform community dialogue and district planning.

STRUCTURE & ORGANIZATION

The ARA is organized in 16 geographic regions, aligned with Chicago Neighborhoods Now planning zones. The regions were created by the City of Chicago's Department of Planning and Development based on research on housing and jobs. They are defined with natural boundaries, such as rivers and railroads, in mind. These elements, as well as transportation options, are likely considerations for families in choosing schools. With the goal of utilizing a consistent structure year to year, these regions are more stable than city wards and school networks.


In addition to the regional structure, the ARA is organized to better understand what families and communities need in terms of school options. To best answer that question, data is provided in four areas:



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KEY FINDINGS



- There are 54 schools, 32 of which are Level 1+/1, 13 are Level 2+, 7 are Level 2, and none are Level 3.
- 73% of elementary students who live in the region attend a Level 1+/1 school, 40% of high school students attend a Level 1+/1 high school, and 24% of Options high schools attend a Level 1+/1 school.
- There are more than 2,832 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats, 95 unfilled Level 1 high school seats, and no Level 1+/1 Option seats.
- 100% of Level 1+/1 elementary seats have no admissions criteria. Of Level 1+/1 high school seats, 27% have no admissions criteria, 40% have some programs with admissions criteria, and 33% have admissions criteria.



- The student population in the region is 48,551, which has dropped by 4.5%
 (approximately 2,300 students) since the 2015-16 school year. This is a smaller decline
 than the total CPS student enrollment drop of 7.9%.
- Enrollment in schools in the region has dropped even more (approximately 2,200 students or 4.7%).
- There are 4,304 more seats than students enrolled in the region.

CHOICE


- 60% of students in this region attend their zoned school, 22% of students attend a non-zoned school in the region and 18% of students attend a non-zoned school out of the region.
- 31% elementary students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel less than one mile and 36% travel for less than 15 minutes. 50% of high school students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel more than three miles and 51% travel for more than 45 minutes.



- The region has high density of elementary Dual Language programs. There are some
 elementary Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM), Personalized Learning,
 International Baccalaureate (IB), and Fine & Performing Arts programs. The region does
 not have World Language nor Academic Center elementary programs.
- For high school students, there are available seats for all programs including Career & Technical Education (CTE), Selective Enrollment, JROTC (Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps), Personalized Learning, Fine & Performing Arts and IB. The Early College STEM program has the highest seat density in the region.

The Greater Midway region is bounded on the north by West 51st Street, the Stevenson Expressway, and the CTA's Orange Line; on the east by South Central Park Avenue, the B & O Central Railroad tracks, and Metra's SouthWest Service Line tracks; and on the south and west by the city's border with suburban Hometown, Burbank, Bedford Park, and Summit. It is also bordered by Lyons, Stickney, Oak Lawn, and Evergreen Park. It is home to 259,000 residents and is served by five train stops.

DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION

The Greater Midway region is growing in Hispanic students and losing African American students


The Greater Midway student population has become slightly more Hispanic and less African American. The percentage of Hispanic students has risen from 80% to 83% in the past four years and the percentage of African American students has dropped from 14% to 12% in that time. The percentage of students qualified for Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) has dropped from 87% to 84% in the past four years, which is higher than the district average of 77%.

RACIAL/ETHNIC COMPOSITION











The majority of the students in the Greater Midway region are Hispanic, with the east section being home primarily to African American students.






The Greater Midway region is primarily made up of lowincome neighborhoods, with a higher-income area west of Midway airport and in the southern area of the region.


HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?





HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?






HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?






HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?


There are 22,042 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 6,713 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 2,036 students enrolled in Level 2 schools. There are 2,832 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region.

100% of Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region, including the 2,832 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats, are in schools with no admissions criteria.

NOTE: Enrollment in these charts includes all students who attend schools in the region regardless of where they reside. Admissions criteria refer to test scores, grades, attendance, or other requirements for admissions. Due to rounding, some charts may not add up to 100%.



ELEMENTARY



There are 2,833 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 7,691 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 1,187 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools. There are 95 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region.

ADMISSION TYPE OF LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS



Of all Level 1+/1 high school seats in the region, 73% are in schools with some admissions criteria and 27% are in schools with no admissions criteria. All 95 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats are in schools that have no admissions criteria.




DO STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS?





HOW MANY SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT POPULATION?







ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?



School choice is currently defined as attending a school that is not a student's zoned school. Over the past four years in this region, elementary students attending a non-zoned school (in or out of region) has risen from 24% to 26%. In the same time frame, students attending their zoned school has declined from 75% to 74%.





Of the 31,563 elementary students residing in the Greater Midway region, 73% attend a Level 1+/1 school. 74% of students who attend their zoned school go to a Level 1+/1 school; for students who attend a non-zoned school in the region, that number falls to 73%; and for students who leave the region, that number is 65%.




STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY



Of the 3,254 elementary students who attend school out of the region (see above), most are African American and Hispanic. Hispanic students, however, attend a school out of region at a much lower rate than other ethnicities.

SCHOOL QUALITY BY STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY




Hispanic elementary students who attend school out of the region, as compared to African American students, attend Level 1+/1 elementary schools at a significantly higher rate -78% compared to 40%.

ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?



16% of elementary students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1+/1 school. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract schools or another zoned school in the region.

10% of elementary students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1+/1 school. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract schools or another zoned school outside the region.

26% of students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 31% stay within one mile of their home and 33% travel more than three miles. The majority – 67% of students – travel for less than 30 minutes.



GREATER MIDWAY: OUT OF REGION "CHOICE FOOTPRINT" (K-8TH)






ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?

In the 2017-18 school year, CPS launched a new high school application process, GoCPS, which created a single application and timeline for all high schools. Only high school programs that require an application for admissions are included. Applicants were asked to rank the schools and programs on their application in order of preference. Students are guaranteed a seat in the general education program at their zoned/neighborhood high school and did not have to submit an application for that program. 

In the Greater Midway region, 3,453 8th grade students applied to a variety of high school programs in Rounds 1 and 2 of the GoCPS application process.


% OF STUDENTS WHO RECEIVED AN OFFER FROM ONE OF THEIR TOP 3 CHOICES

School choice is currently defined as attending a school that is not a student's zoned school. In the same time frame, students attending their zoned school has declined from 41% to 36%.



Of the 14,179 High school students residing in the region, 40% attend a Level 1+/1 school. For students attending school out of the region, 75% attend a Level 1+/1 school; for students attending a non-zoned school in the region, that number is 35%. 15% of students attending their zoned school attend a Level 1+/1 school.



Of the 4,352 students who attend school out of the region (see above), the majority are Hispanic and African American. Hispanic and White students, however, attend a school out of region at a much lower rate than other ethnicities.


SCHOOL QUALITY BY STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY



African American students attend Level 1+/1 schools at a lower rate than Hispanic students – 45% compared to 82%.




33% of high school students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend Level 2+ schools. Overall, most students attend other zoned schools in the region

31% of high school students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend Level 1+ schools. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract schools outside the region.

64% of high school students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 50% travel more than three miles for school and 29% travel more than six miles. 49% of students who do not attend their zoned school travel for less than 30 minutes while 32% travel for more than 45 minutes.


DISTANCE TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL

TIME TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL





PROGRAM DENSITY: The Program Density Index measures the "density" of certain academic programs in each region. The index is calculated as the number of program seats per 100 age-eligible CPS students who reside in the region; this index can be used to compare program availability across regions. For high school programs, this index is calculated using the number of seats available for 9th grade via the GoCPS application process and the number of 9th graders who reside in the region. 






HOW MANY PRE-KINDERGARTEN SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT POPULATION?




