**Re: Proposed Closure of Simon Guggenheim Elementary School**

Dear Parent or Guardian:

As Chief Executive Officer of the Chicago Public Schools (CPS), nothing is more important to me than making sure your child is getting access to a high quality education. My team is dedicated to ensuring that every child in every community can be successful in the classroom and graduate ready for college and career – which is why I am writing to you today.

There are too many schools in Chicago failing our children. Across the District, only 7.9% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders last year tested ready for college, while achievement gaps for African American and Latino students remain in the high double-digits. As adults, we all have a responsibility to make sure that we are putting the academic needs of our children before all else. To do so requires some very difficult but necessary choices to boost the academic achievement of our kids.

For too long, Simon Guggenheim Elementary School (Guggenheim) has been one of the schools not meeting the needs of its students. Over the last several years, Guggenheim has been a chronically underperforming school with an ISAT “meets/exceeds” score that is below that of other schools in its area. This is why we are proposing today, after a very lengthy and thoughtful process, to close Guggenheim and provide your child with access to a better performing school in your community. I know this may be difficult for you to hear because of the connections you have to this school, but I ask that you give us the opportunity to explain this decision and carefully consider the options we are offering to help your child access better school options.

Please take a few moments to carefully review the draft transition plan on this proposed closing that your child will bring home. In this draft transition plan you can learn more about why this school has been chosen to be closed and how we intend to make significant investments in your child’s future to help them be more successful in the classroom.

If Guggenheim should close, students will attend a higher performing school: Carrie Jacobs Bond Elementary School (Bond), at 7050 S. May St. The investments we will make in this school will help boost the academic achievement of your child and ensure a smooth and safe transition for all students, which are outlined in the draft transition plan.

CPS safety specialists have been working closely with other city agencies that are actively engaged in the safety and security of children and schools to build a foundation for this plan, including the Chicago Police Department, Chicago Housing Authority, Chicago Transit Authority and CPS safety specialists. CPS will continue working closely with these city agencies and other community-based organizations in the coming weeks and months to build and implement these plans to ensure the safety of all students impacted by this action.

At these schools, as well as schools across the district, we are making significant investments to boost the academic achievement of our students:

- Providing a longer school day with additional instructional time for teachers and students
- Using a new, more rigorous curriculum that meets Common Core State Standards to better prepare your child for college
- Expanding access to quality preschool programs that put students on the path to academic success from day one of their education

Below you will find more information about why we are considering moving Guggenheim students to a higher performing school to give them access to a better educational environment where they can thrive and succeed.

### **The Guidelines**

I released Guidelines for School Actions (guidelines) that helped focus our attention on the district's lowest performing schools and the communities most in need of better performing school options. The guidelines can be accessed online at [www.cps.edu/qualityschools](http://www.cps.edu/qualityschools). I considered the criteria outlined below when recommending actions, such as reassignment boundary changes, phase-outs, co-locations, school closures, and school consolidations:

1. If a school received the lowest performance level (Level 3) on the CPS School Performance, Remediation, and Probation Policy (Board Report 10-0728-P04) for two consecutive years and was not excluded from consideration based on the minimum performance criteria listed in the guidelines; or
2. If a school is in the process of phasing out based on previous action by the Board; or
3. If two elementary schools within 0.5 miles of each other individually offer less than Kindergarten through eighth grades and can be reconfigured to a single Kindergarten through eighth grade school; or
4. To co-locate a Board approved new or existing school.

The proposal outlined below is one of the tools we hope to use to provide students with better, higher quality school options in their communities.

### **Our Proposal**

Our proposal is to close Guggenheim, located at 7141 S. Morgan St., at the end of the current school year. We are proposing to close Guggenheim because it is a chronically low performing school and students at Guggenheim deserve to access higher quality education options. This proposal meets criteria 1 above because Guggenheim has achieved the lowest performance rating, Level 3, every year since the Level 3 rating was introduced four years ago.

Furthermore, Guggenheim is being proposed because it did not have an ISAT composite "meets or exceeds" score at or above its geographic network average in the previous school year (this compares ISAT scores of all schools located in your CPS Network of schools), nor did it score at or above the 25<sup>th</sup> percentile on the trend and growth component of the CPS Performance Policy in the previous school year.

### **Details For Current Students**

Should the Board approve this proposal, returning students who currently attend Guggenheim will be assigned to Bond. Bond is higher performing when compared with Guggenheim and we are committing to make significant investments in Bond to make the schools even better. CPS will also invest in Bond by providing counselors and other support staff to ensure that all students have a smooth, safe transition. We will outline these resources in a

draft transition plan that will be sent home from school with your child. We will also post the plan at [www.cps.edu/qualityschools](http://www.cps.edu/qualityschools) and in the school's main office.

**Details For The Attendance Area Boundary Of Guggenheim**

I am also proposing to reassign Guggenheim's attendance area boundary to Bond, and Alonzo Stagg Elementary School (Stagg), located at 7424 S. Morgan St., at the end of the 2011-12 school year. We are currently proposing to reconstitute Stagg at the end of this school year.

**Public Comment On The Proposal**

Two community meetings and one public hearing have been scheduled to receive public comment on the proposal.



I invite you to share your feedback on this proposal at the community meetings and public hearing. You may also provide alternate proposals or other suggestions. If you wish to comment at the community meetings or hearing, you must sign up to speak on the day of, at the designated location, beginning one hour before the designated start time and ending one hour after the start of the meeting or hearing. You will have two minutes to speak, unless the hearing officer or meeting organizer provides an extension. The hearing will conclude at the stated end time or following the comments of the last person who has signed up to speak, whichever occurs first.

After the community meetings and public hearing, I will review a written report from the hearing officer. At that time, I may recommend that the Board consider and approve the closure of Guggenheim at its meeting on February 22, 2012.
