What is a Parent Training & Information Center (PTIC)?

Purpose

- Federally funded under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).
- Authorized and supported by the U.S. Dept. of Education's Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP).
- Provide training, information, and assistance to families of children and youth with disabilities.

Scope

- Every state has at least one PTIC; some have multiple or Community Parent Resource Centers (CPRCs). Illinois only has one PTIC.
- Services are FREE to families and focused on rights, collaboration, and student outcomes.

Key Partners & Foundations: CPIR, OSEP, IDEA

IDEA

- Federal special education law ensuring FAPE and procedural safeguards.
- Sets requirements for IEPs, evaluations, eligibility, and parent participation.

OSEP

- Office within the U.S. Dept. of Education that funds and oversees PTICs.
- Focus on results-driven accountability and family engagement.

CPIR

- Center for Parent Information and Resources supporting PTICs nationwide.
- Houses curated resources, fact sheets, and training materials for families and professionals.

Mission

- Empower families to be effective advocates and collaborative partners in education.
- Focus on underserved, rural, and under-resourced communities across Illinois.

- Families of children and youth with disabilities, birth–26.
- Students, educators, and community partners seeking inclusive, personcentered supports.

1:1 Assistance

What We Do

- Listen, clarify concerns, and identify priorities with families.
- Explain rights and processes under IDEA/Section 504.
- Coach families to communicate effectively with schools.
- Help families identify key steps in obtaining needed services.

How It Helps

- Builds family knowledge and confidence.
- Prepares families for meetings and follow-through steps.
- Helps families identify high quality IEPs, supports and services.
- Supports families in asking the right questions during the process.

IEP & Educational Records Reviews

What We Do

- Help families understand IEP components and alignment with needs.
- Review evaluations, progress monitoring, and accommodations for clarity.
- Identify questions families might ask their school teams.
- Help families explore all of their options.
- Provide resources to assist in getting needed services.

What We Don't Do

- We do not write IEPs or dictate services.
- We do not provide legal advice or representation, nor do we make referrals to individual attorneys. Information provided by FMPTIC should never be considered legal advice.

Eligibility Process Guidance

Support Includes

- Explaining referral, evaluation, and eligibility timelines.
- Clarifying consent, independent evaluations, and re-evaluation rights.
- Discussing the difference between IDEA and Section 504.

Family Outcomes

- Families understand next steps, timelines, and documentation.
- Improved collaboration and reduced confusion or conflict.

Educational Surrogate Parent Program (through ISBE)

Overview

- Recruits and trains volunteers to act as the parent in special education decisions when a student has no available parent/guardian.
- Ensures students' rights are protected during evaluation and IEP processes.

FMPTIC Role

- Outreach, training coordination, and support in partnership with ISBE.

Transition Supports & CtLC Education

How We Help

- Use CtLC tools (Trajectory, One-Page Description, Integrated Supports Star) to amplify student voice.
- Coach families and students to align IEP goals with post-secondary outcomes (education, employment, independent living).
- Help families use CtLC to have robust and meaningful conversations about both school experiences and future planning.

Important Note

- FMPTIC acts as CtLC Ambassadors; we are not a CtLC training/certification center.
- We refer to the CtLC Nexus for formal courses, tools, and deeper learning.

Why Families Call FMPTIC

- Understanding evaluation/eligibility decisions or timelines
- Preparing for IEP meetings and decoding documents
- Concerns about progress, behavior supports, or accommodations
- Navigating transition planning and questions about the process of seeking adult services
- Seeking neutral, plain-language guidance to collaborate with schools
- Assistance connecting with needed community resources
- Seeking information about Conflict Resolution options and processes

Common Barriers Families Face

- Limited understanding of rights and processes under IDEA/504
- Access barriers: language, transportation, technology, time
- Communication breakdowns or adversarial dynamics
- Confusing paperwork and dense technical language
- Difficulty linking evaluations, services, and measurable goals

What We Do NOT Do

- Provide legal advice, representation, or act as attorneys
- Regularly attend IEP meetings on behalf of families
- Write letters or file complaints for families
- Dictate services or placements to school teams
- Act as private advocates for families or students

Our Approach: Building Family Knowledge & Competence

- Teach families how to read and use data (evaluations, progress reports)
- Coach on effective, solutions-focused communication with schools
- Model tools (checklists, CtLC) that families can reuse independently
- Center student voice, strengths, and culturally responsive practices
- Provide education on IDEA, IEPs and 504 plans
- Share information on parent and student rights and responsibilities in the special education process


